

## ARP ESSER Health and Safety Plan Guidance & Template

Section 2001(i)(1) of the American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act requires each local education agency (LEA) that receives funding under the ARP Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) Fund to develop and make publicly available on the LEA's website a Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan, hereinafter referred to as a Health and Safety Plan.

Based on ARP requirements, 90 percent of ARP ESSER funds will be distributed to school districts and charter schools based on their relative share of Title I-A funding in FY 2020-2021. Given Federally required timelines, LEAs eligible to apply for and receive this portion of the ARP ESSER funding must submit a Health and Safety Plan that meets ARP Act requirements to the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE) by Friday, July 30, 2021, regardless of when the LEA submits its ARP ESSER application.

Each LEA must create a Health and Safety Plan that addresses how it will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff, and which will serve as local guidelines for all instructional and non-instructional school activities during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. The Health and Safety Plan should be tailored to the unique needs of each LEA and its schools and must take into account public comment related to the development of, and subsequent revisions to, the Health and Safety Plan.

The ARP Act and U.S. Department of Education rules require Health and Safety plans include the following components:

- How the LEA will, to the greatest extent practicable, implement prevention and mitigation
  policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the Centers for Disease Control
  and Prevention (CDC) for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to
  continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning;
- How the LEA will ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services;
- 3. How the LEA will maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff and the extent to which it has adopted policies, and a description of any such policy on each of the following safety recommendations established by the CDC:

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- a. Universal and correct wearing of masks;
- b. Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding);
- Handwashing and respiratory etiquette;
- d. <u>Cleaning</u> and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving <u>ventilation</u>;
- e. <u>Contact tracing</u> in combination with <u>isolation</u> and <u>quarantine</u>, in collaboration with State and local health departments;
- f. <u>Diagnostic</u> and screening testing;
- g. Efforts to provide COVID-19 vaccinations to school communities;
- h. Appropriate accommodations for children with disabilities with respect to health and safety policies; and
- i. Coordination with state and local health officials.

The LEA's Health and Safety Plan must be approved by its governing body and posted on the LEA's publicly available website by July 30, 2021\* The ARP Act requires LEAs to post their Health and Safety Plans online in a language that parents/caregivers can understand, or, if it is not practicable to provide written translations to an individual with limited English proficiency, be orally translated. The plan also must be provided in an alternative format accessible, upon request, by a parent who is an individual with a disability as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Each LEA will upload in the eGrants system its updated Health and Safety Plan and webpage URL where the plan is located on the LEA's publicly available website.

The ARP Act requires LEAs to review their Health and Safety Plans at least every six months during the period of the LEA's ARP ESSER grant. LEAs also must review and update their plans whenever there are significant changes to the CDC recommendations for K-12 schools. Like the development of the plan, all revisions must be informed by community input and reviewed and approved by the governing body prior to posting on the LEA's publicly available website.

LEAs may use the template to revise their current Health and Safety Plans to meet ARP requirements and ensure all stakeholders are fully informed of the LEA's plan to safely resume instructional and non-instructional school activities, including in-person learning, for the current school year. An LEA may use a different plan template or format provided it includes all the elements required by the ARP Act, as listed above.

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\* The July 30 deadline applies only to school districts and charter schools that received federal Title I-A funds in FY 2020-2021 and intend to apply for and receive ARP ESSER funding.

1. How will the LEA, to the greatest extent practicable, support prevention and mitigation policies in line with the most up-to-date guidance from the CDC for the reopening and operation of school facilities in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning?

After reviewing the most up-to-date guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for the operation of school facilities, the Oil City Area School District (OCASD) will, to the greatest extent practicable, evaluate those recommendations given the existing capacity of our instructional areas and within the context of our individual school buildings. The OCASD plans to continuously and safely operate our schools for in-person learning for all students.

2. How will the LEA ensure continuity of services, including but not limited to services to address the students' academic needs, and students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, and other needs, which may include student health and food services?

The OCASD will ensure continuity of services to address students' academic needs as outlined in the Emergency Instructional Time Template, filed as outlined in Section 520.1 of the School Code. The OCASD will maintain our current level of staffing in our school counseling, special program services, health, and food service departments, to help ensure the continuity of services to address students' and staff members' social, emotional, mental health, health, and nutritional needs.

Per the ederal requirement, face coverings must be worn in public transportation – this includes school uses.

Modifying facilities to allow for physical distancing (e.g., use of cohorts/podding);	In addition, the Superintendent shall have the uthority to determine mask regulations on the asis of then-current circumstances.  If required by the PA DOH/CDC, students will be hysically distanced and spaced to the maximum extent possible in the OCASD instructional spaces ased upon classroom capacity.
c. <u>Handwashing and respiratory</u> etiquette;	The OCASD will ensure that handwashing trategies include washing with soap and water for t least twenty seconds, especially after going to ne bathroom; before eating; and after blowing ose, coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are ot available and hands are not visibly dirty, ndividuals will use alcohol-based hand sanitizer.  CDC handwashing resources that include health romotion materials, information on proper andwashing technique, and tips to help children evelop good hand washing habits will be shared with OCASD families.
	The OCASD will ensure that adequate supplies of oap, paper towels, hand sanitizer, and tissues will e available in all school buildings to support ealthy hygiene practices.  PA DOH and CDC posters will be posted in all DCASD cafeterias, restrooms, and other high traffic reas.
d. <u>Cleaning</u> and maintaining healthy facilities, including improving <u>ventilation;</u>	Frequently touched surfaces and objects within the chools and on buses/vans will be cleaned and lisinfected on a daily basis (at the minimum). This notludes, but is not limited to, door handles, sink landles, and drinking fountains.  The OCASD will ensure that HVAC systems (i.e., leating, ventilation, and air conditioning systems) are operating properly.

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Classrooms and common areas will be ventilated vith additional circulation of outdoor air when ossible, utilizing open windows, doors, and/or ans. Records of any persons, not including students and e. Contact tracing in combination with isolation and quarantine, in taff, that enter the building, their reason for being collaboration with the State and here, the location within the building they visit, and local health departments: he names of close contacts whom they visit in the uilding will be maintained. The OCASD may provide information on the istrict's website and via letters and messaging bhone calls, text messages, and email messages) ia the SchoolMessenger system, as needed. The OCASD will prepare students and families for Iternative instructional models (i.e., a move to emote learning) if a class, grade level, or school hust make a temporary instructional model change. DCASD will inform staff, students, and families of DC recommendations concerning students and taff diagnosed with COVID-19 pertaining to solation requirements. DCASD will inform staff, students, and families of DC recommendations for students and staff who ave been in close contact with an individual fected with COVID-19 and who are not fully accinated. All students and parents/guardians are encouraged Diagnostic and screening testing; b constantly monitor for COVID-19 symptoms – specially prior to arriving at school or at the bus top each day. No student with COVID-19 symptoms should be ent on a bus or brought to school. Students and staff will consistently be made aware f the signs and symptoms of COVID-19.

All district staff are encouraged to perform a ymptom screening on themselves prior to leaving br work each day and should remain at home if ill. Students and staff should go to the nurse mmediately if feeling symptomatic. The OCASD will share resources with the school ommunity to help families understand when to eep children at home. g. Efforts to provide vaccinations The OCASD will communicate with local health to school communities: gencies to review opportunities to receive accinations. The OCASD will help to publicize vaccination pportunities within the community. h. Appropriate accommodations The OCASD will consult and update individual for students with disabilities ealthcare plans for students with complex needs. with respect to health and tudents with medical concerns, students unable to safety policies; and naintain proper social distance, students requiring and-over-hand instruction and support, students equiring assistance with feeding/toileting will have xtra strategies implemented to meet their specific eeds. These strategies include:

- Staff to thoroughly wash hands/use hand sanitizer immediately before and after working with each student.
- Limit the use of communal objects for student reinforcement. If such objects are used with multiple students, each object should be disinfected immediately before and after student use.
- Personal student electronic devices should be disinfected each time a student enters or exits the classroom.
- Bathrooms and changing areas should be disinfected before and after student use.
   Limit students' use to one at a time.

	Students should be assisted with hand washing.
i. Coordination with state and local health officials.	The OCASD will coordinate with local and state ealth officials on all aspects of the ongoing OVID-19 pandemic as appropriate.
